Background

- recommendations from Perko Ngurratti Healing Messages Forum (SA 2006)
- a grant provided through Cancer Australia, Supporting people with cancer initiative funded by the Australian Government
- supported by CanNET (CA initiative)
- built on Cancer Council models of training
- · aiming for accreditation
- aim for training to be delivered by Aboriginal RTO







Development of modules

- partnership between Aboriginal Health Council of SA, SA Health (CanNET SA) and Cancer Council SA
- Course Advisory Group established (national focus)
- Facilitator's Guide, Student Guide, Assessment tools and Activities Checklist developed
- applied to Community Services & Health Industry Skills Council (CSHISC) – industry led body that oversees qualifications and training product development and
- Australia Skills Quality Authority (ASQA)- the national regulator for vocational education and training

Pilot delivery – HLTAHW035

- 5 day pilot held April 2012
- 10 Aboriginal health professionals participated
- evaluation undertaken pre and post & 6 week follow-up
- well received
- Increase in cancer knowledge and confidence
- time for sharing experiences & knowledge important
- site visits very valuable





Accredited training - so what?

- recognised qualification for Aboriginal health professionals (nationally recognised Certificate of Attainment)
- supports professional development and career pathways
- meets national quality assurance requirements
- provides appropriate standard of competency
- delivered by appropriate Recognised Training Organisations (RTOs)
- Sustainable
- RTOs required to undertake validation process to ensure relevant and current






Accreditation process

- identified need unique not adapted
- letters of endorsement from Aboriginal health organisations and industry representatives
- submission to ASQA and CS&HISC cost
- accredited training for Aboriginal health professionals called Provide information and support around cancer (HLTAHW035)

Challenges

- capacity and priorities of Aboriginal RTOs
- · up-skilling of RTOs educators
- ongoing partnership long term commitment eg: Cancer Council SA and Nunkuwarrin Yunti
- Needs to be delivered as a 'stand alone' unit as well for greater reach extra cost to do this
- keeping key stakeholders informed





Tumbi-warrun "Restoring"

Lessons learnt

- culturally appropriate, relevant and accredited cancer training is valued but first step
- training priorities and costs some of the barriers
- · 'Train the trainer' approach
- · need to partner and work with Aboriginal RTOs delivering unit
- · sharing of training resources adapt to local context
- flexible approach to delivery
- · ongoing process
