### Nationally recognised hepatitis B tool now available in 11 languages

The Hep B Story App, a leading hepatitis B health education resource by Menzies School of Health Research (Menzies) is now available in 11 Aboriginal languages, with the recent addition of Wubuy and Murrinh Patha.

Launched today at Menzies, the app is now accessible in the first language of more than 70 percent of Aboriginal people living in the Northern Territory (NT).

This important resource is part of the Hep B PAST program which has been <u>acknowledged</u> <u>nationally</u> as a successful and innovative model - one that should be considered for national scale up as part of Australia's strategy to eliminate hepatitis B as a public health threat by 2030.

Known for its ease of use and being culturally tailored, the app sets itself apart from others, through the Menzies Hep B team's on-going engagement and consultation with community and health services across the NT.

First launched in 2014 in English and Yolnu Matha, the app was developed through extensive consultation and partnership with healthcare workers, the Galiwin'ku community in North East Arnhem Land, and people living with chronic hepatitis B.

Through the sustained efforts of researchers, Aboriginal Health Practitioners, community members, translators and program partners, the app has been expanded to now include 10 additional languages: Kunwinjku, Tiwi, Arrernte, Warlpiri, Pitjantjatjara, Burarra, Anindilyakwa, Kriol, Wubuy and Murrinh Patha.

The Hep B Story App is a visual, interactive app that is designed for patients living with hepatitis B (hep B) and their families. It tells the story of the hep B virus, and shares how it can be transmitted, the symptoms of the virus and ways it can be treated and prevented.

The Hep B Story can be <u>accessed online</u> as well as downloaded from the <u>Apple App Store</u> or <u>Google Play</u>.
